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The new Start menu

With Windows 8, Microsoft decided to ditch the Start button — a core feature of all previous versions of Windows, which allowed users to navigate directly to programs, files and functions quickly and efficiently. The move was widely criticised and Microsoft has responded by re-introducing the familiar yet improved Start menu in Windows 10.

The Start menu in Windows 10 allows quick access to apps and programs, as well as the ability to quickly search for content. It can also be customised by “pinning”, moving and re-sizing items to create your own personalised menu of favourite and most used programs, websites, files and contacts.

Cortana: a virtual personal assistant

One of the stand-out innovations of Windows 10 is the inclusion of Cortana. Described by Microsoft as “your truly personal digital assistant”, Cortana is a clever little application that responds to your personal data and provides you with personalised updates, such as calendar reminders and task management support.

Cortana can also provide better, more personalised search results. For example, you could ask, “Where did I save that Word document I was working on last night?” or “How is the weather looking tomorrow morning?” and Cortana will help you out. What’s more, if you’re simply bored or have time to kill, you can even ask Cortana to sing you a song, tell you a joke or do a good impression, and she’ll duly oblige!

Microsoft Edge: a new web browser

Microsoft Edge is a more advanced web browser, which takes the place of Microsoft Internet Explorer. Edge is much faster than Internet Explorer, as well offering more advanced search functions (which integrate the use of Cortana to deliver more clever, personalised results).

In addition, Edge has a “writing on the web” feature that allows you to take notes, highlight, and doodle directly onto web pages. Edge also has a nifty “reading list” function, allowing you to save stripped-down, distraction free content for you to consume later, at your own convenience.

New Windows store: a one-stop shop for apps, games and entertainment

Windows 10 comes with a range of free, built-in apps such as Skype and Microsoft OneDrive. In addition, a new Windows store allows users to download additional apps to their computer (some are free, some paid) — ranging from productivity apps, to games and entertainment.

Advanced multitasking

Windows 10 has a few impressive features that allow for more advanced multitasking. First of all, a “task view” button at the bottom of the desktop zooms out of wherever you are in order to see all open programs and apps. Windows 10 also allows you to split your screen in two, with one app taking up one side, and another app taking up the other — very useful for cross-referencing or moving data between apps. You can even create multiple desktops, saving specific configurations of apps and programs that suit different purposes of computer usage.

Windows Hello: a personalised, secure way to access your device (password-free)

You can sign-in to your Windows 10 computer as usual, via a secure password. However, depending on the capability of your device, Windows 10 allows even more convenient (yet no less secure) ways of unlocking your computer. Using biometric technology, users can set up their device for face, fingerprint, or even iris recognition access. That's right, unlocking your computer with the touch of a fingerprint or the scan of your face or eye via your webcam. The future is here...

Microsoft Continuum: integrate your phone with your PC

If you own a Windows smartphone, Continuum will allow you to integrate seamlessly between devices — and even use your phone as your primary computer, with all core Microsoft apps such as Word, Excel and Powerpoint, scaling up from your phone to the big screen.

With Continuum, you can connect your smartphone (either via a cable or wirelessly) to a keyboard and monitor, which in effect uses your phone as a desktop computer. You can also connect your phone wirelessly to a TV, using it as a remote control or to browse the web.
